Some of you may know that I am a runner. I love running long distance, and I've competed in cross country and track both of my high school years. What I've learned and what many runners will tell you is that mental strength and perseverance is probably the most important part of running. Yes, physical strength is important, but if you don't have the mental toughness it takes to push through the pain, you'll never get where you need to be. That mental strength not only benefits you on a run; it helps you through the rest of your life. You learn what to lean on when hard times are ahead, and how to push through hard things for a better reward. It's very similar to climbing a mountain: you can be the physically strongest person in the world, but if you don't fight through the hurt, you'll never get up the mountain.

Our faith is like that. We can be strong, smart, rich, athletic, popular, attractive, or successful, but none of that fulfills us or gets us to heaven. It's like saying you're going to climb a mountain and then going into a valley. But if we put our faith in God, if we trust that He's real, He's here, and He cares about us, He can lead us up the mountain.

You've heard that idea over and over in our sermon by now, but another major part that isn't talked about quite as much is the struggle it takes to remain strong in our faith. It's significantly harder to be a Christian than it is to not be a Christian, and it takes a ton of self discipline to stay on the path. But here's the deal: if we don't do that now, if we just say that God is real and preach the gospel without believing it and committing to it ourselves, a few things will happen. First of all, you aren't likely to get to the top of the mountain, whether that metaphorical mountain is the path to Heaven or to joy and fulfillment. And secondly, it can make it harder to earnestly deliver the message of hope to others. When we remain solid in our faith and the teachings of God, we become truly fulfilled with what we're doing. We stay on the path and know the way much more consistently, and when we fall off (because we all do), God is there to guide us back. We can get to the beauty that God offers us at the end of the road, and we can spread all of that to others through our testimony.

I don't mean to scare anyone with this, and this isn't an accusation. This is just a reminder that it's so important to nurture your faith and remain disciplined in it. Today, I encourage you to do a little something more to connect with God, whatever that means for you (pulling out your Bible, praying, or talking to someone here about God). I leave you with 1 Corinthians 9:25-27, which says, "All athletes are disciplined in their training. They do it to win a prize that will fade away, but we do it for an eternal prize. So I run with purpose in every step. I am not just shadowboxing. I discipline my body like an athlete, training it to do what it should. Otherwise, I fear that after preaching to others I myself might be disqualified."
